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MEPRD GRANT CYCLE FUELS \$11.4 MILLION IN PARK AND TRAIL PROJECTS ACROSS MADISON AND ST. CLAIR COUNTIES

More than \$2.6 million was awarded under the FY 2024 grant cycle, which ran from July 2023 through May 2024. The awarded grants will support twenty-seven local park and trail enhancements in the Metro East, which represent a \$11.4 million investment in the region's recreational facilities and outdoor spaces.

MADISON AND ST. CLAIR COUNTIES, IL – The Metro East Park and Recreation District (MEPRD) Board of Directors approved twenty-seven grant requests totaling \$2.6 million as part of the FY 2024 Park and Trail Grant Program. These grants will support local and county agencies, municipalities, park districts, and transit districts in Madison and St. Clair Counties, IL, funding projects aimed at enhancing public parks, regional trails, and recreation facilities. In total, the awarded projects represent a \$11.4 million investment in the region's parks and recreation.

The Park and Trail Grant Program is an annual grant opportunity offered by MEPRD to local and county governments, park districts, transit districts, 501(c)3 nonprofits, and other entities in Madison and St. Clair Counties, IL. The program—which is funded by the Metro East Park and Recreation District Tax, a one-tenth (1/10) percent sales tax approved by the voters of Madison and St. Clair counties in 2000—focuses on improving and expanding public parks and green space, enhancing access to/accessibility of existing facilities, and growing the trail network.

Since its inception in 2001, MEPRD has committed more than \$40.5 million in grant funding. A total of 212 projects have been completed and another 63 projects are currently underway, including trail development, pools and splash pads, sports lighting, all-inclusive playgrounds, accessibility upgrades, and other recreation amenities.

Under the FY 2024 grant cycle, which ran from July 2023 through May 2024, qualifying applicants could apply for a reimbursement grant of up to 40% of the eligible project cost, with a maximum award of \$100,000 for park projects or \$300,000 for trail projects. In total, a record twenty-seven Park and Trail Grants were awarded last cycle totaling \$2.6 million.

MEPRD Grant Coordinator Cole Preston remarks, "Investing in quality parks and recreation can have a profound impact on both communities and the region as a whole. It not only enhances public recreation but also improves public health, promotes active transportation, boosts the local economy, and elevates

overall quality of life. With the record number of projects awarded last cycle, we are excited and optimistic about the future, and MEPRD is proud to contribute to this positive momentum."

Additionally, two (2) <u>Community Planning Grants</u> were also awarded by MEPRD last cycle. The Village of Hamel received funding for developing a parks master plan, and Jarvis Township was granted funds for a bicycle-pedestrian infrastructure master plan. MEPRD also approved five (5) <u>Event Sponsorship Grants</u>, supporting events that make use of or promote the use of public parks and trails in the Metro East.
